### Why a Dissolution Plan?

- Citizens presented a petition to the Village Board in 2007 to put dissolution to a vote
- State law requires developing a Plan so citizens know what will happen if the village dissolves
- Registered <u>Village</u> voters will vote on Nov 3, 2009 whether or not to dissolve

### Our Charge

The Johnson City Dissolution Committee was responsible for:

- Preparing a proposed Dissolution Plan
- Holding a public meeting
- Presenting the Plan to the JC Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees holds a Public Hearing and then puts a resolution on the ballot.

### Required Elements of Dissolution Plan

- 1. Effect on services
- 2. Effect on employees
- 3. Fiscal effects of dissolution
- 4. Disposition of land and assets
- 5. Methods for paying outstanding debts
- 6. Inter-municipal agreements
- 7. Continuation of local ordinances
- 8. Other topics

## What Will Happen if the Village Dissolves?

# 1. The Town of Union Becomes Responsible

• With dissolution, the Town of Union becomes the municipal government for Johnson City residents.

 The Town Board becomes the local elected body to represent Johnson City residents.

## 2. Effect on General Government Functions

- The Mayor and Village Board will be eliminated.
- The Village Court will be eliminated and the Town of Union Court will provide judicial services.
- Administrative functions will be carried out by the town.
- Village Hall will be sold.
- Library will continue as a Town service.

## 3. Fire and Ambulance Services Will be Continued

- Town of Union will create a fire protection district for the former Village.
- The Town will contract with the Village of Endicott to provide full-time, professional fire protection services using Johnson City facilities.
  - No fire stations will be closed if the Village dissolves.
  - Fire department will continue to provide First Response Emergency Services.
  - Ambulance services will continue with the Union Volunteer Emergency Squad (UVES).

## 4. Police Protection Will be Continued

- Town of Union will create a police district for the former Village
- Town will contract with Broome County Sheriff's Department to provide full-time patrol and investigation services
- A Sheriff's Department substation will be located in the current Village's Police/Court Building

### 5. Public Works Services Will be Continued

- Refuse collection will be provided by the Town of Union.
- Street repair and snow plowing will be provided by the Town of Union.
- All parks maintenance will be provided by the Town of Union.

## 6. Water and Sewer Will Continue As Is

- No change in service delivery
- Provided by the Town of Union through Water and Sewer districts
- Paid for by user fees

### Effects on Employees and Retirees

Note: The estimated net reduction would be affected by retirements and other attrition before the dissolution date of January 1, 2011.

#### Impact on Johnson City Retirees

- According to the Plan, there will be no changes in the retirement or health insurance benefits for:
  - Retirees or surviving spouses
  - Employees who retire before dissolution.

#### **Estimated Financial Effects**

General Government	\$591,000
Fire Services	\$1,142,000
Police Services	\$2,525,000
Public Works (Combined)	\$368,000
Total	\$4,626,000

## Impact of the Plan on Village Taxpayers – **Lower Taxes**

- Village Taxpayer Currently Pays an equivalent of \$368.78/\$1,000 Property Tax for village and town services
- Per the Plan, Village Taxpayer will pay \$261.17 for those services.
- Estimated TOTAL NET Tax savings: 29.2%

Note: The tax figures shown do not include services for which there is no tax impact per the Plan (i.e. water, sewer)

# Impact of the Plan on Town Taxpayers – **Lower Taxes**

- Current Village Revenues Transfer to Town
  - Sales Tax from Broome County
  - Fees
  - State revenues
- PLUS Town Receives \$1,000,000 annual increase in State AIM incentive funding
- RESULT Town of Union Taxes to DECREASE

## Impact on County Taxpayers - **NO CHANGE**

 There is <u>no</u> shift to county taxes. The costs of the sheriff providing Police services to Johnson City is a special district fee paid by Johnson City residents

#### **Other Considerations**

## Village Assets - TRANSFER TO TOWN

- Sewer Plant: No Change paid by fees
- Public Safety Building: No Change becomes
   Town Court Building and Sheriff Substation
- Village Hall will be sold
- Carousel No Change Town will run
- Fire Stations No Change will be used
- DPW Buildings No Change Town will use

### Other Items Transferred to the Town

- Some Village debt will be transferred to the Town
- Village codes and planning and zoning will be transferred to the Town and those unique to the village will be retained
- Village inter municipal agreements will be transferred to the Town

### Village Identity

- Only Johnson City's government would dissolve.
- No effect on the school district or Post Office.
- Community of Johnson City lives on.

- Village Board considers comments received from tonight's hearing
- Village Board prepares referendum for ballot.
- Referendum vote, November 3, 2009.
- If referendum passes, Village dissolves 12/31/2010.
